As a podcast host yourself, you should definitely listen to podcasts. How else will you

discover what works, what doesn't, and pick up great ideas for future developments?

Here is a short list of podcasts about podcasting which I recommend you check out:

Show title: School of Podcasting

Podcaster: Dave Jackson

My notes: Dave is my go-to source of information about podcasting. He's been producing and

presenting shows for years, is a great host and provides all sorts of useful services for podcasters. I

particularly like Dave's show because his advice is always practical and aimed at getting you

started; he won't over-geek you or encourage you to spend money on equipment you don't need.

Show title: The Podcraft Podcast

Podcaster: Colin Gray

My notes: Colin is another of my preferred sources of quality podcasting information and his own

podcast is well worth checking out. His back catalogue is packed with all sorts of fabulous

information and I suggest a pick 'n' mix approach in the first instance, prioritising those topics

which are most useful to you

Show title: The Feed

Podcaster: Libsyn

My notes: This is the podcast show produced by the team which provides my preferred podcast

distribution service, Libsyn. It has a whole rack of previous episodes and I'd recommend you start

by picking the topics which are most relevant to you.

**Conferences** 

I will admit that I've never attended a podcasting conference, mainly because the dates have a

nasty habit of clashing with other things that I have going on. However, I am a big fan of

networking and learning events and recommend them highly to you.

This short list reflects UK and US venues and should be regarded as a starter kit. Do a Google

search for *podcast events*; you'll soon discover that many more are available:

Event: Podcast Movement (US location)

My notes: Probably the biggest and best-known – this is the event which every podcaster needs to

know about. On-demand recordings can be purchased if you can't attend in person.

My notes: This is my 'local' podcasting event and is a who's-who of UK podcasting talent.

**Podcast mastermind groups** 

Courses and mentoring can provide huge benefits and I've been a frequent consumer of

with a price tag attached, so they're not for everyone, but if you do want to take things to the next

What's on offer? Podcast Media Masterclass at the offices in Peterborough, UK or a complete

'done-for-you' podcasting and editing service.

My notes: This is the podcasting mastermind group that I am a member of in the UK. Rob Moore

presents a couple of podcasts of his own and has built an entire education and support service

around it. The quarterly meetups are always packed with great guests and useful information.

Provider: Colin Gray

What's on offer? Podcasting courses, personal coaching and support, and resources and tools.

My notes: Colin has some great courses available and I particularly like the range of what's on

offer. There are regular Q&A support sessions, so if you need ongoing 'hand-holding' this will be

great for you.

Provider: Dave Jackson

What's on offer? Dave provides a variety of packages to suit every budget and requirement.

My notes: Dave's support is excellent, and I have used his services personally, paying him to review

my show and give me feedback and tips.
